IN THE NEWS

- A NIH-funded study **shows** that early intervention yields the best results in psychosis.
- Another study <u>revealed</u> that people with depression who benefited from a placebo showed signature changes in the brain and also responded better to subsequent medication. Understanding the placebo effect may give answers for brain physiology and pathology.
- Another study has pointed towards a potential <u>new target</u> for treating diseases like amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) and frontotemporal degeneration (FTD). <u>Studies</u> have also shown that a viral gene mechanism may underlie ALS.

- The NIH-funded Human Connectome Project (HCP) has been <u>making progress</u> on how brain wiring may be linked to uniquely human traits.
